

















ADVOCACY EFFORTS DELIVERING FOR BALONNE

Over recent decades, the role of local government has undergone a marked shift away from a simplistic notion of 'Roads, Rates and Rubbish', and towards an ever-increasing level of responsibility and obligation to advocate for support from State and Federal governments.

If Council's budget for 2025/26 is anything to go by, rates revenue will cover around \$13-14 million, while the remainder of the \$53 million budget comes from a broad range of State and Federal government grants and funding programs.

Like other local governments, our Council is undertaking a wide array of advocacy with State and Federal governments and is achieving some outstanding results for the residents of Balonne.

Mayor Samantha O'Toole is proud of our Council's advocacy efforts and of the great results Council has been achieving.

"We welcome the recent announcement by the Queensland Government through its Country Roads

Connect Program to fund the sealing of the final 10.4 kilometres of Jakelwar-Goodooga Road North," said Mayor O'Toole.

"We understand the importance of our State road network and have successfully lobbied for additional work to be undertaken on the St George-Noondoo section of the Castlereagh Highway for shoulder widening and we are currently awaiting the outcome of a number of other Transport and Main Road projects in our Shire.

"Council has also been successful in receiving \$1,019,904 as part of the Queensland Government's Residential Activation Fund to develop further housing opportunities in the Shire.

"Our efforts have also just paid off with funding for another 12-month position of a Workforce Development Officer as part of the Queensland Government's Growing Workforce Participation Fund.

Last week, our Local Disaster Management Group met to report progress for ongoing actions and to discuss requirements for the upcoming high risk weather

These meetings are always a great opportunity to gain a broader perspective of the weather outlook, advancements and capabilities of our emergency departments and gain detailed information on prospective hazard risks across our region, especially after years of consecutive rainfall events.

As much as I would like to see no significant events in the Shire this summer season, the reality is disasters can strike at any time and as an LDMG and as a community we all need to be prepared for the unexpected.

If we all take the time to prepare by clearing vegetation and debris around properties, locking away flammable substances, cleaning out gutters, preparing an emergency plan and having an emergency evacuation kit ready to go, we can reduce the risk to yourself, your family and our community.

After all, a well-prepared property is easier to defend and reduces the risk to surrounding properties and community.

There is a whole range of useful tips and advice on the Queensland Fire Department and Get Ready Queensland websites, and I would urge everyone to head there and check out everything that is available.

Council has Emergency Evacuation Pack starter-kits available for pick-up at our upcoming Get Ready Days and at the main office and I would urge everyone to drop into your local event to chat with emergency service personnel and pick up a pack.

We will also have a range of information available at Get Ready Days on the Australian Warning System, which is used by all emergency services to inform the community on how to respond during an event.

Insurance Roundtable Voicing Concerns Over Rising Premiums

In September, our Mayor joined with other South West Queensland Regional Organisation of Council leaders to attend an insurance roundtable in Charleville to chart a way forward on skyrocketing insurance premiums throughout the region.

The roundtable was Chaired by the Queensland Reconstruction Authority along with representatives from the Insurance Council of Australia, individual insurance companies, the Local Government Association of Queensland (LGAQ), the National Emergency Management Agency and the Hon Ann Leahy MP

Participants discussed the significant impacts of premiums which have risen by over 350% in some cases despite a reduction in



flood risk due to improved mitigation infrastructure across the region.

Balonne Shire Mayor and Chair of SWQROC Samantha O'Toole said the roundtable proves that goodwill exists to find a pathway forward.

"The strength of our regions depends on resolving this issue and to be frank so does the public reputation and standing of Australia's insurance industry," said Mayor O'Toole.

Local Business Receives National Recognition

"On a broader level of government services, and following years of lobbying from our Council, the Queensland Cross Border Commissioner Ian Leavers was appointed in August 2024.

"The Commissioner has now visited us on three occasions and is working hard to improve communications between NSW and Qld emergency services by advocating for improved training outcomes and capabilities for Police to work across our borders.

"The Commissioner is also helping to establish a seamless living experience for our residents who might work on both sides of the border, like trade qualifications being recognised in each State and reducing the duplication for our volunteers.

"Recently, we met with the Minister for Education, seeking continued support for the Agriculture Water Environment (AWE) immersion program at the St George State High School.

"The AWE has also received valuable support from the Isolated Children & Parents Association who see it as an opportunity to serve as a hub for innovation, sustainability and economic growth for students with a pathway into the agricultural study and careers.

"In partnership with the Western Queensland Alliance of Councils and the South West Regional Organisation of Councils, we have advocated for fast internet speeds across the region, frequent flights to Brisbane, quality roads and housing solutions.

"Together with these organisations we have also achieved some great results, like stopping the injection of carbon waste into the Great Artesian Basin, and just recently we met with a broad range of insurance representatives and key government officials in a bid to reduce sky-rocketing insurance premiums in regional Queensland.

"We have also been seeking input into the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games and working on improved tourism promotion of our region.

"Over recent years, we've also successfully lobbied for growth in exclusion fencing in the Shire with the Wild Dog Exclusion Fencing Program to now have around 70% of the Shire covered to assist in pest management.

"As a Council, we fully understand that advocating for the needs of our local community is the new norm in operating a local government and we will continue to push for other levels of government to deliver for our community and Shire."

Moonie River Beef Challenge Success

Moonie River Beef Challenge has wrapped up for 2025 and the organisers want to thank everyone involved, including the sponsors, those who donated cattle or joined a syndicate, sponsored feed or attended the Gala Dinner.

This year saw an increase in weight gained by the steers with the average weight gain of 2.34kg/day, which is an increase of 0.55kg/day from last year.

With this increase in weight gain, the Chaplaincy in South Queensland saw an increase in profits to over \$180,000, with over \$90,000 of that going towards Chaplaincy in the Balonne.

The Gala Dinner was a fitting celebration of this outstanding result with winners announced and Aussie Country Music singer Brendon Walmsley singing a masterfully blended set of heartfelt storytelling with themes of love, family, and faith.

The Storyfest South West festival is going from strength to strength with a huge increase in attendance at its second annual instalment in September 2025.

Storyfest South West festival is supported by Council and delivered by Somerset Storyfest with the aim of providing regional communities with equitable opportunities to interact

The festival included a range of workshops, author panels dinners and informal community gatherings for

This year's festival was attended by 17 schools, an increase from 12 schools in 2024 and sold in excess of 1,500 tickets, which is up from 1,100 ticket sales in 2024.

The art display involved local students hand decorating their own timber fish, which were fixed like waves throughout the Cultural Centre and adorned an art feature with crocheted marine life, designed by local artist Kimberley Thornton.

Hebel Upgrades Build on its Attraction

Travellers and locals in Hebel can enjoy the new facilities and better connection throughout the township with the delivery of Stage 1 of the Hebel Master Plan implementation.

This first stage of implementing the Hebel Masterplan included the installation of a new electric BBQ in the Bokhara River Park picnic area, a rejuvenation of park facilities and a 270 metre footpath connecting the park to the Hebel General Store and Pub.



An additional 160 metres of footpath was added along William Street connecting the Pub, Hebel Hall and Doctor's clinic down to the tennis courts.

This project was made possible thanks to joint funding from Balonne Shire Council and the Queensland Government's Building Bush Tourism grant.



Mungindi Community Rallies to Support Local Families



It's been a long road for the community in Mungindi to get a new childcare in place, but all their efforts have now come to fruition.

In what should be considered an exemplary case study in community spirit, Mungindi residents banded together to build and develop a new childcare facility on the New South Wales side of town, following an announcement to close the childcare facility on the Queensland side.

For some areas, losing a key piece of community infrastructure like this is just a fait accompli, but not for the tenacious residents of Mungindi!

For around 20 months the Mungindi Community Education Association tirelessly set about lobbying governments, applying for grants and delivering a broad range of fund-raising initiatives from harvest donations to raffles and a gala dinner to raise a staggering \$950,000 to set up a new facility.

Mungindi Community Education Association president Lisa Orchin said she was lost for words when watching the first children enter the facility.

"We're absolutely thrilled with the result, and it'll be great to expand into after-school or vocational care to meet the needs of the community," Mrs Orchin said.

"Childcare affects every single one of us, no matter what stage of life we're at.

"It captures the heart of what rural communities can do, and I think it gives hope to others that there is a way and it can be done.

"It doesn't matter whether you were a platinum or gold sponsor, or just bought a raffle ticket, everybody in our town has done something to support this new daycare facility.

"People say to me they have no kids, so it doesn't affect them, but we have the children of nurses, teachers and police officers at the daycare.

"It also means we can develop our farming businesses and prepare for the next generation, because if there aren't basic facilities that families and staff need, what's the point?"





Council Increasing Dog Ownership Compliance

Owning a dog can be an extremely rewarding experience, but it also comes with a great responsibility.

As a Council, we are committed to creating a safe and pet-friendly environment for our pets and our community.

Recently, we have had a number of incidents involving dogs and we are acting to increase compliance and ensure our community is kept safe from any future incidents.

From 1 October - 31 December we will be undertaking an Authorised Inspection Program across the Shire and will be issuing fines for unregistered pets at premises.

To keep our community safe, we will also be issuing on-the-spot fines of \$333.90 for roaming dogs, dogs being walked off-the-lead and for not picking up dog poo in public spaces.

ENVIRO-COLUMN FERAL PIGS



Feral pigs are typically smaller, leaner and more muscular than domestic pigs with well-developed shoulders and necks, and smaller, shorter hindquarters.

They are mostly black, buffcoloured or spotted black and white and their body is usually covered in sparse, coarse hair and they have a longer, larger snout, longer tusks, a straighter tail and narrower back than domestic pigs.

Feral pigs can carry many infectious diseases and internal and external parasites that can spread to domestic pigs, other livestock. They can also transmit sparganosis, melioidosis, leptospirosis, Q fever and brucellosis to humans.

They can also cause extensive damage to crops, livestock, pastures and the environment.

There are a range of measures available to landholders to manage feral pigs, including fencing, trapping, shooting, dogging and poisoning.

The Committee also distributed four \$500 bursaries to local high school students and CUC students following a competition aimed at increasing cultural awareness of the role Amoy shepherds played in shaping the strong agricultural sector we enjoy today in Balonne.

Mungindi Flood Marker Tells a Historic Tale

Council has installed a new historic flood marker on the banks of the Barwon River, which tells a nostalgic tale of flooding events in the region.

The flood marker is located in the Mungindi River Park and marks the height and years of the seven highest recorded flood levels back to 1890.

The highest flood level of 8.5 metres was recorded in 1903, followed by 8.2 metres in 1890, 8 metres in 1976, 7.9 metres in 1996/1998/2022, 7.8 metres in 1956/1984/1988, 7.7 metres in 1950/1971/1974/2011, and 7.6 metres in 1921/1953/1983.

Mayor Samantha O'Toole said

the flood marker in Mungindi highlights how important it has been for the region to be prepared for flooding.

"This historic flood marker is a great reminder of how our region and community has always had to be resilient and prepared for major flooding events over time," said Mayor O'Toole.

"We hope this installation is yet another great tourist attraction for the region and a reminder to the local community of how important it is to



remain vigilant and be ready for any future flooding events."

We all know that sinking feeling when the blue and red lights flash from behind for a traffic stop, even when you've done nothing wrong.

Learner drivers in Balonne got to experience this feeling first-hand in a safe and secure Learner Driver Program delivered by our local Police to give them the skills and experience of knowing how to handle the situation safely.

The Program involved closing down the St George airfield at night and having Learner drivers lap the circuit, while Police, Ambulance and Firies put them in the thick of some simulated on-road experiences.

Program participants received a prior presentation on road rules before getting behind the wheels on the airfield to experience getting pulled over for traffic stops, random breath test stations and safely pulling over for emergency service vehicles wanting to pass.

St George Officer-in-Charge, Sergeant Megan Down was pleased with this first offering of the Leaner Driver program.

"This was a great way to give our learner drivers a real-life experience in safely operating a vehicle around emergency services in the confines of a safe environment," said Sgt Down.

"We are looking forward to doing this program again in the future and we will advertise any future dates locally."
