## A message from the Mayor

Recently, I attended the annual conference of the Local Government Association of Queensland (LGAQ), along with Mayors and senior staff from 77 Councils throughout the State.

The meeting in Mackay was the 125th annual conference of this organisation, founded in 1896, so the fact it has been going for a century-and-a-quarter demonstrates it is performing a valuable service.

To me, there were three major issues at the conference:

Sustainability of local councils, a big issue that was discussed at length;

The new conflict-of-interest legislation that is coming in to correct some of the excesses of the existing harsh legislation; and

Recognition of how widespread the housing shortage is throughout regional Queensland.

The existing conflict-of-interest legislation has been recognised by the State Government as being too harsh and too complicated and confusing for Councillors, and the Government is bringing in some more reasonable rules. This is something the LGAQ has been campaigning for on behalf of all Councils across the State.

On the housing issue, the Western Queensland Alliance of Councils report into housing was tabled at the conference, and there were several motions seeking both State and Federal Government support to try to ease some of the housing shortages – both properties to purchase and properties to rent – in western Queensland.

One of the practical steps governments could take is to allow first-home buyers to purchase existing homes under the scheme.

I think it is important that all three levels of government have recognised the difficulties of finding housing for people wanting to move to western Queensland and how serious this problem is.

That's an important first step.



There was also recognition that many rural and regional councils are not financially viable long-term, and this is what we mean by the future sustainability of councils.

There is support for an increase in Federal Government funding in particular for councils, and there is a review going on right now in Queensland into Federal Government funding.

We expect to see the results of that review by the end of this month and its findings will be a big piece of the puzzle about how councils can be financially viable in the long term.

This is a very important issue, especially for the more remote councils with smaller populations who can't maintain the facilities needed by residents and visitors in the years ahead.

This is an issue we will certainly be advocating about with the Federal Government and the Opposition between now and the federal election, which will be held by the end of May next year, just seven months away.

There was a motion at the conference for the Federal Government to restore funding for councils across Australia to one per cent of the total federal tax revenue, and this will certainly be an election issue.

## **AUSTRALIA DAY AWARDS: NOMINATIONS OPEN NOW**

Nominations are officially open for the 2022 Balonne Shire Australia Day Awards.

The awards recognise local residents' extraordinary efforts and achievements within our community, across a variety of categories.

For 2022, nine awards are open for Balonne Shire residents:

### 1. Citizen of the Year

Balonne's Citizen of the Year is someone aged 26 years or older, whose efforts result in short and long-term benefits, and promote the welfare and wellbeing of our community.

They can be a volunteer or someone who goes above and beyond in their paid work - or someone who does a bit of both.

The Citizen of the Year is a role model for others in the Balonne community.

### 2. Young Citizen of the Year

Balonne's Young Citizen of the Year is someone aged under 26 years, who meets the same criteria as Citizen of the Year.

### 3. Cultural Award

The Cultural Award winner is someone of any age who makes a significant contribution to, or is a high achiever in, local cultural life and activities.

Examples include, but are not limited to: performers, artists, visual arts projects, literary projects, and cultural heritage expression or conservation.

## 4. Sports Award (senior)

The Sports Award winner is someone

aged 26 or older, who has made major sporting achievements as part of a community club.

## 5. Sports Award (junior)

The junior Sports Award winner is someone aged under 26 years, who meets the same criteria as the Sports Award winner.

### 6. Sports Administrator Award

The Sports Administrator Award winner is someone aged 26 years or older who has made a significant contribution to local sports clubs through coordination or administration.

This can include coaches, officials, or any sporting club volunteer who is vital to keeping a local sporting club operating.

### 7. Volunteer of the Year

Balonne's Volunteer of the Year is a person of any age who shows a high level of community participation, service and involvement.

They are the kind of person who goes above and beyond for their community through volunteer work.

## 8. Event of the Year

Balonne's Event of the Year is any event organised by a local resident (or residents), which has delivered an outstanding community service and a high level of community participation.

The event should show a reflection of Australian values, and achieve it's stated purpose.

## 9. Community Group of the Year

Balonne's Community Group of the Year is any group whose members are local residents, which has delivered an outstanding community service.

The group's activities will have a high level of community participation, and a significant impact on the local community.

## Local Government awards celebrate the people behind Council's success

Balonne Shire's own Di Francisco has been named an inaugural Local Government Association of Queensland Community Champion, in recognition of her immense impact on the region.

Both were awarded the title at the annual LGAQ Conference in Mackay where Councils from across the state gather to solve common issues - and each also received \$4,500 in funding for professional development.

Nominated for her tireless efforts during COVID-19, Di has helped countless locals, visitors, businesses and community groups navigate difficult restrictions which have been a hallmark of the pandemic; efforts which are above and beyond her role as Environmental Health Officer.

Di thanked everyone at Council and in the community, who are ahead of the curve in pandemic preparedness.

## When will Council reach my road?

Crews' progress is governed by weather conditions, water availability, emergency repairs, and other factors outside of Council's control. Works can get delayed by rain or machinery breakdowns, or can be pushed to a later date if a site has no available water source. This update is an approximate guide

to Balonne Shire roadworks.

## What is Disaster Recovery

Disaster recovery roadworks include: surface correction, gravel re-sheeting, formation grading, concreting and more, to repair damage from the February 2020 severe weather event.

These are proudly funded by the Commonwealth and Queensland Governments through the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA).

## What is RMPC?

RMPC (Roads Maintenance Performance Contract) works are routine maintenance on state-owned roads. They are managed by the Department of Transport and Main Roads, and the work in Balonne Shire is carried out by Council's Road Crews.

## What is TIDS?

The Transport Industry Development Scheme is a state government funding program, which provides money to local governments for transport-related initiatives that support state government objectives. Those objectives include: increasing works on the local government transport network, promoting regional development and building a safe and sustainable transport system.
