

Calling for Expressions of Interest for Business Mentoring

Program Overview:

- Two rounds of up to 15 Ag and Hort Businesses per round
- Round 1 EOI close 17 December 2019
- Round 1 commences late January 2020
- Participants selected based on EOI objectives and outcomes proposed
- Participants matched with mentors with relevant Ag and Hort experience

Benefits:

- No cost to the participant
- Dedicated one-on-one mentoring for up to 22 hours per participant
- Initial business review of operations
- Potential for feasibility study funding (case by case and subject to outcomes)
- Up to \$2000 incentive per participant (with matching funds) to purchase equipment or materials that will add value to farm operations
- Strategy and development of action and business plans and other mentoring benefits;
- Participate in focused group workshops (3) in Balonne Shire facilitated by industry leaders;
- Ongoing in-kind support from Balonne Shire Council and business services partners.
